
Charles Ornstein is the managing editor/local at ProPublica. In that role, he oversees ProPublica's local initiatives, including its Local Reporting Network, regional units in the Midwest, South and Southwest, and a joint investigative unit with the Texas Tribune. Articles he has edited have won the Pulitzer Prize for Public Service, the Selden Ring Award, the Scripps Howard Impact Award, the National Magazine Award and many other national honors. He worked with ADN on the Pulitzer Prize-winning "Lawless" series.



Francine Orr has been a staff photojournalist for the Los Angeles Times since 2000. She was raised in Colorado and earned bachelor's degrees in both history and art from the University of Saint Mary. Orr has focused on public health and poverty issues in Africa, India and the United States. In Los Angeles, she has concentrated on the growing homeless crisis since 2005.



John Sharify is a 79-time Emmy Award winner with nine National Edward R. Murrow Awards, including the National Murrow for top news writer in the country in 2004, 2007, 2008 and 2020. Sharify is also the recipient of the 2021 DuPont Columbia Award, the broadcast equivalent of the Pulitzer Prize, for his documentary "Bob's Choice." He was selected as the 2015 and 2019 National Press Photographer Association Reporter of the Year for his work at NBC affiliate, KING 5 News. Sharify is the University of Alaska Anchorage Atwood Chair of Journalism.



Joseph Huerta is a photojournalist from KING 5, the NBC affiliate in Seattle. His love for skateboarding helped establish his unique approach to visual storytelling. He is also a faculty member of the National Press Photographer Association News Video Workshop, where he helps train and mentor journalists worldwide.




